John of Joinville, The Life of Saint Louis -the story of Louis IX, King of France, who led the seventh and eighth crusades Baha al-Din Ibn Shaddad, The Rare and Excellent History of Saladin -a biography of the ruler who took Jerusalem back from the crsuaders in 1187

Usama ibn Munqidh, The Book of Contemplation -the recollections of an "Arab gentleman" who lived side-by-side with the crusaders
